The Mount Eaton Landfill temporarily closed in 2005 due to regulatory issues. The closure has not affected the District with regards to landfill capacity.

The District realized a significant drop in disposal at District landfills from out-of-state generators and a small drop in disposal from out-of-district (in-state) generators. The District's solid waste generation has remained steady over the past five years. Although there is no direct or immediate impact to the District regarding the trends listed above, the District intends to monitor the in-flows of out-of-district solid waste disposal in the future.

The District is in the third year of comprehensive surveying of all sectors in the Tri-County area. This effort has produced a significant increase in recycling data. The District surveyed 1,585 industrial businesses, 4,930 commercial businesses, 64 compost facilities, all three county recycling offices, 31 recycling brokers and facilities and 51 solid waste haulers. The District did not count broker or hauler data in order to eliminate double counting issues. The District used the surveys and OEPA compst facility data to calculate yard waste data. All yard waste data was cross referenced to ensure no double counting was encountered.

The District did not conduct any specific feasibility studies in 2005. The District relies on several committees and sub-committees of the Board of Trustees and the Policy Committee for guidance on recycling, education/awareness and other solid waste issues. Some of the solid waste issues that were evaluated in 2005 by the committees included the possibility of conducting a comprehensive recycling program study for the entire District, opposition to proposed landfill expansions and proposed constructions, curbside recycling, drop-off recycling and other miscellaneous issues.
